

# Comparing Kaplan Test of English (KTE) Test Scores

## 1 Alignment of KTE test scores with the CEFR

The table below shows recommended threshold Kaplan Test of English test scores and their corresponding CEFR (Common European Framework of Reference for Languages) levels. This mapping of the test scores to the CEFR level has been externally verified by Ecctis<sup>1</sup> following a comprehensive review and analysis of the test. An executive summary of Ecctis' report is available upon request.

<b>C2</b>	Can understand with ease virtually everything heard or read. <b>C1</b>	Can understand a wide range of demanding, longer texts, and recognise implicit meaning. Can express him/herself fluently and spontaneously without much obvious searching for expressions. Can produce clear, well-structured, detailed text on complex subjects, showing controlled use of organisational patterns, connectors, and cohesive devices.	<b>500 – 534</b>
<b>B2</b>	Can understand the main ideas of complex text on both concrete and abstract topics, including technical discussions in his/her field of specialisation. Can interact with a degree of fluency and spontaneity that makes regular interaction with native speakers quite possible without strain for either party. Can produce clear, detailed text on a wide range of subjects and explain a viewpoint on a topical issue giving the advantages and disadvantages of various options.	<b>425 – 499</b>
<b>B1</b>	Can understand the main points of clear standard input on familiar matters regularly encountered in work, school, leisure, etc. Can deal with most situations likely to arise whilst travelling in an area where the language is spoken. Can produce simple connected text on topics which are familiar or of personal interest. Can describe experiences and events, dreams, hopes & ambitions and briefly give reasons and explanations for opinions and plans.	<b>350 – 424</b>
<b>A2</b>	Can understand sentences and frequently used expressions related to areas of most immediate relevance (e.g. very basic personal and family information, shopping, local geography, employment). Can communicate in simple and routine tasks requiring a simple and direct exchange of information on familiar and routine matters. Can describe in simple terms aspects of his/her background, immediate environment and matters in areas of immediate need.	<b>275 – 349</b>
<b>A1</b>	Can understand and use familiar everyday expressions and very basic phrases aimed at the satisfaction of needs of a concrete type. Can introduce him/herself and others and can ask and answer questions about personal details such as where he/she lives, people he/she knows and things he/she has. Can interact in a simple way provided the other person talks slowly and clearly and is prepared to help.	<b>225 – 274</b>

## 2 Comparing KTE test scores to IELTS Academic overall scores

The table below shows recommended threshold KTE test scores and their corresponding IELTS Academic band scores. This score comparison is based on our revised concordance study<sup>2</sup> completed in January 2024 (Kondratek, 2024), using the *kernel method of test equating* (von Davier, Holland, Thyer, 2004; Cardwell et al., 2024). The range shaded in light blue denotes the IELTS band scores which are deemed to be equated to KTE test scores with the highest level of confidence<sup>3</sup>, i.e. with the standard error of equating on the IELTS scale at or below 0.075 (Kondratek, 2024). Concordance between IELTS and KTE test outside of the shaded range should be interpreted with caution.

When making high-stakes decisions, we recommend institutions consider other factors like high school GPA, other test scores, recommendations, or interviews. As a best practice, when setting minimum thresholds, it is useful to set scores flexibly and conduct periodic reviews of score requirements.

<sup>3</sup> Verifying robustness of the equating functions under different methodological choices is one of the approaches recommended to assess validity of the equating procedure by Cardwell et al. (2024).

### 3 Comparing KTE test scores to TOEFL iBT overall scores

On 1 January 2026, TOEFL introduced an updated score system scale for TOEFL iBT. The new scale includes bands from 1 to 6 in increments of 0.5, and is fully aligned with the CEFR. For a period of two years, i.e. 2026 – 2028, TOEFL will continue to report scores using both the old 0-120 scale and the new 1-6 scale.

As both the KTE test scores and TOEFL iBT scores have been aligned to the CEFR Levels we can compare KTE test scores with TOEFL iBT scores using the CEFR Levels as proxy, as captured in the table below. It is important to note however, that KTE has not been statistically equated with TOEFL iBT (unlike with IELTS, cf. Section 2 above), therefore, comparisons between the two tests should be considered with caution. Test takers are advised to verify institution-specific entry requirements on the institution’s webpages directly.

\*\*\*The TOEFL iBT test provides the highest measurement precision at language-proficiency levels B2 and C1, which are typical requirements for admissions in higher-education institutions.

## 4 Comparing KTE test scores to Pearson PTE Academic overall scores

As both the KTE test scores and Pearson PTE Academic scores have been aligned to the CEFR Levels, we can compare KTE test scores with PTE Academic scores using the CEFR Levels as proxy, as captured in the table below. It is important to note however, that KTE has not been statistically equated with PTE Academic, therefore, comparisons between the two tests should be considered with caution. Test takers are advised to verify institution-specific entry requirements on the institution's webpages directly.

## 5 Comparing KTE test scores to LanguageCert Academic overall scores

As both the KTE test scores and LanguageCert Academic scores have been aligned to the CEFR Levels (Common European Framework of Reference for Languages), we can compare KTE test scores with LanguageCert Academic scores using the CEFR Levels as proxy, as captured in the table below. It is important to note however, that KTE has not been statistically equated with LanguageCert Academic, therefore, comparisons between the two tests should be considered with caution. Test takers are advised to verify institution-specific entry requirements on the institution's webpages directly.
